This course will use feminist and interdisciplinary readings to discuss the myriad experiences of women, children and men who find themselves in situations of forced migration and displacement due to street level and organized violence, structural dislocation due to neoliberalism and globalization and the push and pull factors that extract people from their home countries to foreign lands. We will explore the challenges presented to communities fleeing structurally complex situations and the receiving communities' responses to these mobilizations. We will discuss the local, regional and global responses to creating long-term and meaningful change in communities most affected by migration. We will examine issues of oppression, violence, vulnerability, power, and the structural factors that have worked historically and in current times to create situations of fear, crime, persecution and violence impacting communities.
